To unify and strengthen ties between marginalized communities, and to acknowledge the issues of gentrification and oppression that we still face today. Filipino Night 2017 seeks to recognize Filipino American leadership in preserving the culture of Filipinos and fellow marginalized communities in Seattle.

The fight continues.

Jaden and Riley are two Filipino American students at the University of Washington. Though they are opposites in personality, they are the best of friends. Their knowledge of Seattle's Filipino community expands when they meet Rey, a wise and lively elder working at the Bush Garden. Rey shares with them the legacy of Bob Santos and the Gang of Four.

Growing up near the International District, Bob sees racial and social injustices happening all around him. When Bob returns from the Navy, he meets his first love, Anita, and witnesses the construction of the interstate—infrastructure that begins to tear apart the community that he calls home.

A few years later, the International District faces an even greater problem: the Kingdome. With the construction of a 70 million sq. foot arena, elders and community members could lose their homes, their history, and their livelihoods. Bob joins forces with Seattle community members, activists, and allies who, together, fight for the ID—but not without a cost.

Will they be able to be able to save the International District from the Kingdome? Is the fight for justice worth the personal sacrifice?



GANG OF FOUR

BOB SANTOS



Robert "Bob" Santos was a beloved civil rights leader and activist in the 1960's and 1970's. Together with the Gang of Four, Bob Santos fought tirelessly to preserve Seattle's International District. He recognized the importance of protecting the culture and identity of a community during a time of major gentrification. While always quick to make a joke, he inspired countless others to follow suit and push for equal rights, equal housing, and equal representation. Through perseverance, hardship, and sacrifice, Bob Santos embodied the fighting spirit, always ready to lay it all down on the line for his beliefs. Being a man of great drive and passion, his love for his community was barely overshadowed by his love of life. An uncle to all those who knew him but a hero to us all.

_ARRY GOSSETT



Larry Gossett has been a dedicated public servant for over 40 years and has accomplished a great deal in the Seattle community as well as worldwide. He attended the University of Washington where he was instrumental in the founding of the Black Student Union and fought to eliminate racial discrimination and increase the enrollment of African Americans and other students of color at the University. He is as passionate and committed to his work as he is to his family. He inspires all he meets and exudes power with such elegance and prowess that leaves you in awe. He is a current member of the Seattle King Council, having served as the chair in 2007 and 2013 and the last remaining member of the Gang of Four.

GANG OF FOUR

ROBERTO MAESTA



While teaching Spanish at Franklin High, Roberto Maestas first met Larry Gossett during a student protest at the school. Inspired by the students' activism, he himself became an activist. He led the first ESI Program at South Seattle College and taught Latin American Studies courses at UW. He also led the occupation of the old Beacon Hill School and transformed it into El Centro de la Raza, a multiethnic community center dedicated to building unity and community among people of all races. The community center provides not only social services and ESL programs to the community but also international relations in Central America. As a community activist with a very strong personality, he advocated for multi-racial coalitions and workers' rights movements. His impact in the community is evident even today.

BERNIE WHITEBEAR



Bernie Whitebear was an American Indian/ Filipino Sin-Aikst native, who grew up on the Colville Reservation of Northern Washington, Bernie was born during the building of the Coulee Dam. The construction was a turbulent time for the Sin-Aikst—it disrupted culture, violated ancient burial grounds, and completely cut off access to salmon, something that the Colville tribe had in their life for centuries. During his lifespan, Whitebear made many contributions to the American Indian society, including fighting for the Daybreak Star Indian Cultural Center to be on Indian land. He provided a home for the United Indians of All Tribes Foundation, which was monumental in advancing American Indian educational and cultural programs. Dedicated and compassionate, Bernie Whitebear always stood up for his people no matter what the odds were.

HISTORY/REFERENCES PAGE

As a local Filipino American social and political activist, Bob Santos, known as Uncle Bob, dedicated a large portion of his life to maintaining and revitalizing Seattle's International District. Through the late 1960s and 1970s, Uncle Bob began to fight for the rights of Asian Americans and other marginalized communities living in the International District, working to preserve the people and place that he called home.

Filipino Night incorporates the stories and cultural communities of Larry Gossett, Bernie Whitebear, and Roberto Maestas—political leaders that later banded together with Uncle Bob to form Seattle's legendary Gang of Four.

Gentrification is the renovating/improving of a given area in order attract an influx of more affluent residents. This can have disastrous consequences for those already living in these areas as they can be subject to displacement.

St. Peter Claver Center was a popular location for community meetings. Uncle Bob Santos worked here as a caretaker and would let various minority activist groups use the auditorium for their meetings for free.

The Kingdome was a multipurpose stadium that served as a home to the Seahawks, the Mariners, and the Sonics. Its construction was opposed because of concerns that it would profoundly affect International District residents' way of life.

Groundbreaking Ceremony was a ceremony marking the beginning of construction on the Kingdome. A small group of demonstrators attended to protest the impact that the Kingdome would inevitably have on housing and small businesses in the ID.

Asian Student Coalition (ASC) is a UW student organization that demanded the establishment of an Asian American studies program and the hiring of more Asian American faculty and administrators. Notable here for organizing the Kingdome protest.

Housing and Urban Development (HUD) was a department founded as part of President Lyndon Johnson's "Great Society" program. On Novemeber 14th, 1972, protesters gathered at the International District's Hing Hay Park and marched together on the HUD Seattle office to demand funds to rehabilitate the neighborhood.


